The 47. Infanterie-Division was formed from the 156. Infanterie-Division on December 30, 1943, in the Calais area of France and defended this area against Allied invasion forces from June to August 1944. It suffered heavy losses in the Mons area of Belgium in September and withdrew to Germany. In October 1944 the division was reorganized as the 47. Volksgrenadier-Division at the

Truppenübungsplatz Wildflecken. In November and December 1944 it defended the Roer River sector. The division moved southward from Duren to defend the Haguenau area in January 1945, withdrawing to Germany in early March. Information presented herein was obtained from the records of the division, from those of the OKH, Allgemeines Heeresamt, Abwicklungsstab (H 41/25), T78, Roll 141, and from situation maps of Lage Frankreich.
