Army Group North was established on September 1, 1939, from the former Army Group 2 for the Polish campaign under the command of Field Marshal Fedor von Bock. Records of Army Group 2 dating from 1936 to 1939 are included in the series. In early October 1939, Army Group North was redesignated Army Group B and was sent to the western front. On April 1, 1941, the former Army Group C was redesignated Army Group North. Under the command of Field Marshal Wilhelm Ritter von Leeb, it assembled along the northern border of East Prussia and was poised for the invasion of Russian-held Lithuania and Latvia. The units of Army Group North spearheaded the drive through the Baltic area toward Leningrad and northern Russia. On January 25, 1945, the Army Group was redesignated Army Group Kurland. On the same day Army Group Center was renamed Army Group North. This army group was disbanded on April 2, 1945, and its staff was transferred to the 12th Army (AOK 12).*
